He remains our User Group Representative, MSC Treasurer, Instructor, Contest Director again for the NZ Grand Prix and all round important good guy. Stranger Things

Day 3 was a racing task. Ridge was expected, although the winds were light (around 10 to 14 kts). thermals weak and patchy. It had been decided the day before, that due to tracking, no start times would be announced on the radio (as we usually do). The task distance 329.1km. Thermalling near Thames was essential to get around and no one knew each others start time, but 2 pilots completed the task in exactly the same time (to the second) and yours truly 2 seconds slower. All 3 gliders had the same handicap, no winglet's and no ballast (of course). The contest SeeYou program could not differentiate 0.02 kph, so all pilots were awarded 1,000 points. It's staggering to think that this could happen over a 300+km task and almost 3 hours duration.


Joint Club Captains

GPK and GXP's LXNAV \$100

The new LXNAV S100 is far more technical than the ACD-57. I have been flying with the S80 in GYL and I am still not completely familiar with all of it's features. The following is just some basics. Unlike the ACD-57, it's harder to get into trouble if you don't know how it works, just treat it as a vario, but knowing how to adjust the volume, bringing up wind direction and calculating a final glide are all things that are easy to get wrong if you don't know.



SWITCHING ON AND OFF— Press the top or bottom rotary switch to switch on. You then need to set the QNH with the bottom rotary switch and press the middle switch to confirm. *DO NOT SWITCH THE MAIN POWER SWITCH OFF* without shutting down the S100 first. The instrument has to be shut down like a computer by long pressing the top rotary switch. The front S100 in PK will also switch off the back one, but the back one will only switch off the back one.

PROFILES— You can have your own settings, but unless you know all the parameters, do not attempt to install your own. It's safer to select *CLUB* and get use to familiar settings first.

OPERATING MODES— There are 5 operating modes INFO, FLARM, THERMAL, WAYPOINT and TASK, plus a separate SET UP MODE. To toggle between them press the middle button. The Waypoint and Task modes have a digital display page beneath them. Access is by pressing the bottom button.

QUICK ACCESS MENUS

For each mode a quick access menu to available, which varies from mode to mode. Items available in the quick access menus are:-

- MC/BAL
- Reset G
- Layout
- Edit target (only FLARM page)
- FLARM traffic (only FLARM page)
- Select (Only in WPT mode)
- Select Near (Only in WPT mode)
- Send WPT
- WPT elevation (Only in WPT mode)
- Event
- Night

- Edit Task (only in task mode)
- Start (only in task mode)
- Next (only in task mode, visible only after pressing Start)
- Restart (only in task mode, visible only after pressing Start)
- Load (only in TSK mode)
- Save (only in TSK mode)
- Wind (only in WPT and TSK mode)

Access is by pressing and/or rotation the bottom rotary switch.

QNH and RESERVE ALTITUDE

Turn the lower rotary switch until you get QNH and Res Alt and press. You can then adjust to the airfield pressure, Note the reserve altitude. Both of these figures affect final glide calculations.

SELECTING A WAYPOINT

Scroll to Flarm, Waypoint or Task screen and press the lower rotary switch. Press MC/BAL and set the McCready. I usually set to 2 knots and sometimes higher if it's a strong wind day. Then go to SELECT (which you will need to pick from the whole list of waypoints) or SELECT NEAR which will enable you to pick waypoints close to you. The waypoint will then appear on the waypoint screen and include altitude required to achieve the safety altitude to the finish circle around the waypoint or the waypoint if unusually it is fixed. I have been let down multiple times with final glide calculations, so always take them with a grain of salt. If the altitude numbers are reducing it gives you time to put on place plan B.

There is too much to give much more than the basics. The only way to get use to it is by using it. I may put a smaller amount of info in future Flypapers, but remember the on-line manual is the place to go always. Manuals • LXNAV Gliding https://gliding.lxnav.com/lxdownloads/manuals/






