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Harold Oates

Further to Iggy's email, it's very sad to report Life Member Harold Oates' passing on 2nd Sept. Harold had been ill for the past few years. He was one of the foundation members of our club and on the committee in 1963 (and possibly earlier). His club membership would have been continuous for more than 60 years. While he did quite a bit of gliding (Silver C and was an instructor) his flying was remembered mostly as a Tow Pilot in Tiger Moths and our Pawnee BZA. For several decades Harold would tow every Wednesday, with his wife Mavis doing duty pilot and Les Riesterer instructing. Harold reached a real milestone in the late 1990's with a total of 10,000 tows for the club and by the time he retired from towing he had done 20,000. His biggest day was just over 60 tows. Both these stats are unlikely to ever be bettered in our club again. He was also honored by the club at our 60th anniversary by cutting the cake

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AEROBATIC DAY - Aiden Cartwright

As many of you would have been aware, a few weekends ago on August 6, the New Zealand Aerobatic Club flew down to Matamata Aerodrome with a number of their north island-based aircraft (mostly from Ardmore) for a day of aerobatic flying at Matamata Aerodrome. We had been very fortunate to have been given almost perfect weather, particularly in the morning with barely a breath of wind and not a cloud in sight. Not to mention the warmer than usual temperature. That day was probably the busiest I had seen the aerodrome for a very long time, with a large percentage of the local based aircraft out and flying, making the most of the stunning weather. There was gliding activity taking place as per usual and a couple of Tauranga-based aircraft flew over the hill to join in on the action too. A real hive of activity!

It had been planned that the New Zealand Aerobatic Club were going to be heading down to the aerodrome for a practice day, which was a first for Matamata Aerodrome (at least for a long time). They had many interesting aircraft down, many of which would be easily recognisable by airshow attendees. The box was set-up on the non-traffic side of runways 10/28. It was practically a mini airshow, with many of the solo aerobatic routines being flown not far out from the gliding club clubhouse which was essentially the base for the day. A big thanks to Colin Kelly for putting on a sausage sizzle too which was much appreciated by many!

I was inspired to bring my photography gear along to capture some actions shots of the aerobatic activity - some of these photos will be included in this article. A very big thanks to Sarel Venter for the ride out to the aerodrome, as both of my parents have been eagerly looking at open homes recently as we have just sold our house!

Having had a keen interest in what aerobatic flying was like for some time, I was keen to watch on as the pilots flew their routines with great precision and of course a tremendous amount of skill. I was very fortunate to have been able to meet well-known aerobatic pilots Dave Cranna (who owns and flies his Extra 330LX regularly at Ardmore open days), as well as well-known aerobatic instructor Grant Benns. Both Dave and Grant were awesome to talk to, having given some very useful insight about what it takes to fly aerobatics with skill and precision.

The highlight of the day had to be when Dave and Grant very generously offered to take me for a quick aerobatic taster flight in the Extra 330LX. It is fair to say I was pretty quick to take up the offer. Strapped in, canopy down and Grant started the engine. The front seat is surprisingly spacious and relatively comfortable too - even for me, being taller than average.

It was a real thrill as Grant applied full power – with the acceleration being faster than any other small aircraft I have flown in. Lifting off right before the hangars and we pitched up to about 30 degrees for an exceptionally quick climb to circuit height (unfortunately I cannot remember the exact climb rate). This flight was a real test to see how my stomach handled aerobatics. We flew out towards the box, and we pulled up to begin the first loop. Several loops were to follow, along with three aileron rolls, each with a different roll-rate, barrel rolls, a stall turn, half reverse/ half Cuban eights, and the common wingover turn-around manoeuver. The feeling of experiencing aerobatic manoeuvres for the first time is truly a memorable experience and I am very happy to say that I felt no sign of any motion sickness which was comforting! After what felt like no time at all, we were into the circuit and were setting up for a landing. As glider pilots, we get used to the gradual descent in the circuit, starting from the joining height all the way down to landing. However, in the Extra we flew along at circuit height all the way until where the base-leg turn would be made in the Puchacz if I were flying. Grant commented that it descends like a brick at a low speed, and I really understood what he meant when we touched down right at the perfect spot on the runway. We taxied over to the fuel pumps and Grant turned the engine off.

What an incredible thrill I had just experienced. I would once again like to express my true gratitude and appreciation to Dave for the offer and to Grant for taking me up. Grant was awesome to fly with and really made the flight that much better with his enthusiasm and knowledge. It was a truly memorable experience and I look forward to flying aerobatic manoeuvres again sometime in the future.

Thanks to Dave, Grant and the rest of the pilots and attendees from the New Zealand Aerobatic Club for making that day possible. Matamata aerodrome is a superb site for these sorts of events, with an excellent drainage system (the airfield being built during World War 2), two long and wide runways and plenty of space for aircraft to park. I'm sure that the Gliding Club would agree that the New Zealand Aerobatic Club are more than welcome to use Matamata Aerodrome as a site again in the future. As I write this article, I am still buzzing from the experience, so if you have always wondered what it would be like to try aerobatic flying, I strongly recommend it!
